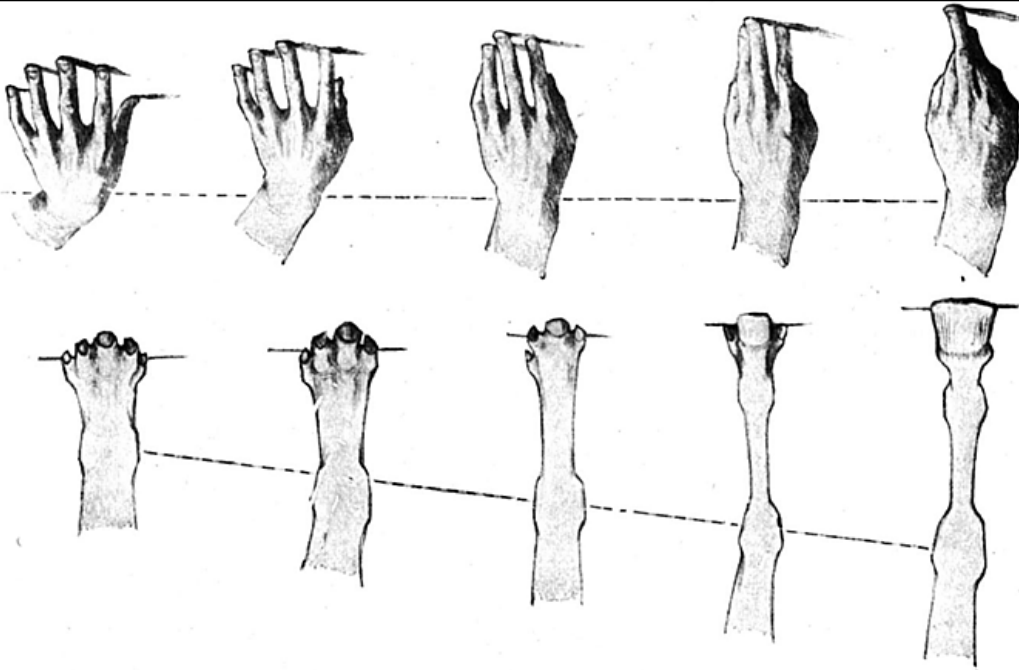

## **RADICAL SELF RELIANCE**

You are radically responsible, but you are also radically free. You are responsible for your own actions. You are responsible for your experience of the event. You are responsible for bringing enough food, water, first-aid and shelter to support yourself for three days. Do not count on anyone to help you through the event. Do not count on Recycled Rainbow to provide electricity or water. Do not expect the community to provide anything for you. If you want something, you're going to have to do it yourself.

## **RADICAL INCLUSION**

Anyone can attend Recycled Rainbow. Respect other's rights to experience the event as they experience it. Some people will not like your sound level. Respect their experience and find a positive compromise with them. There will be people who you will not like. There will be people who do not like you. You don't need to like someone to respect them.

## **GATE HOURS AND TICKETS**

Thursday, September 25: **9am until 8pm**

Friday, September 26: **9am until 8pm**

Saturday, September 27: **9am until 8pm**

Sunday, September 28: **Everyone Must Leave By 2pm**

Tickets cost \$40 if purchased from a Recycled Rainbow volunteer up until the day of the event. On Thursday, September 25 Tickets can be purchased at the gate for \$50. Tickets cost \$60 if purchased on Saturday. Money from ticket sales go to the campground, insurance, permits, promotion and infrastructure.

You must have a ticket to be admitted. You cannot gain admittance by volunteering. **Tickets are Non-Refundable.** No new ticket sales after 6pm. No one will be permitted to enter or leave the campground after 10pm and before 9am. **The gate is cash only.** There is a \$10 re-entry fee.

## ICE AND FIREWOOD

The only thing for sale at Recycled Rainbow are Ice and firewood. Ice is too difficult and costly to make and due to the emerald ash borer beetle, transporting firewood across county lines in Ohio is illegal. Prices for ice and firewood are listed below and are purchased from Big ARB's Campground.

**ICE:** \$1.50 a bag

**FIREWOOD:** 15 pieces delivered for \$6.00

## LAW ENFORCEMENT

RR is a member of the greater community, the greater Cleveland community, Ohio and The United States. We respect local, state and federal laws and everything we do acts in accordance with those laws. There may be law enforcement officers on site. Treat them with respect and they will treat you with respect. **Do not touch law enforcement officers.**

## LEAVE NO TRACE

**THIS IS THE MOST IMPORTANT THING TO REMEMBER...**

Truck it in, truck it out. What you bring with you, you must take with you. **There are NO TRASHCANS OR DUMPSTERS** at Recycled Rainbow. You must take all of your trash with you when you leave. You will leave your camp site in a better condition than how you left it.

- Bring beverages with you in aluminum cans. **Big ARB's Campground prohibits bottles.**
- Leave excess packaging behind at home. Unwrap what you bring and only bring what you need.
- Bring at least three trash bags for your trash as well as for litter you find *even if it is not yours*.
- If you smoke, bring a tin for butts and ashes. **Do not drop your butts on the ground.**
- Put only excrement, bodily fluids and one-ply toilet paper in the restroom toilets and port-o-potties. Do not put paper towels, Kleenex or baby-wipes in the toilets or porta-potties. **No moop in the poop. If it didn't come out of your body, don't put it in the pottie!**
- Never let it hit the ground! Carry a bag with you at all times. If you see litter, pick it up and put it in your bag.
- **You are required to put in two hours patrolling the camp-**

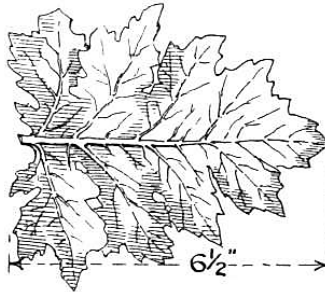
**ground for litter on Sunday.** *This is in addition to the time spent patrolling your own campground!*

### WHAT YOU MUST BRING

- Reusable one gallon or more containers for water
- Enough food and beverages for three days (or as long as you plan to stay)
- First Aid Kit
- Shelter, bedding of some kind, a tent and shelter from rain.
- One roll of single-ply toilet paper
- Portable ashtrays if you are a smoker
- All required prescriptions
- Flashlights and **batteries.**
- A cup for beverages
- An open mind, common sense and a positive attitude

### SITE SPECIFICS

- **The Pavilion is off limits.** The pavilion is used for emergency personnel, emergencies and campground staff only. The restrooms are located next to the pavilion and so the pavilion area may seem tempting to sit in. Please stay out of the pavilion.
- **The Pool is off limits.** We doubt in late September you will want to swim, but nonetheless, the pool area is off limits.
- **Do Not Park Next To Power/Water Drops.** Power and water supply drops tend to constantly drip water and **make lots of mud.** Parking your vehicle next to a power/water drop will increase the chances you will get stuck in deep mud.
- **Do Not Cut Live Trees.** Fallen, dead wood is fair game for firewood, but not live trees or bushes.
- **No Glass Bottles.** Bring your beverages in aluminum cans or plastic bottles. It's easier to clean up when aluminum shatters.

## NO MEANS NO

Recycled Rainbow can be thought of as a social experiment where folks come together to enjoy their art, the gorgeous hill country, and each other to the fullest. There are very few hard and fast rules but two require declaration and elaboration:

- 1. Respect each other's personal boundaries.**
- 2. Take responsibility for your own experience.**

The interplay of these two rules forms a social contract that makes our event a safe place to explore your own boundaries while encouraging respect for each other.

A few words about boundaries: Recognize them and then respect them. People have different comfort levels with physical and emotional intimacy. Further, there are lots of people here who have known each other for years – their boundaries with each other are going to be different than with someone they don't know. Before you assume someone wants a big kiss or a new best friend, ask them. Being direct like this is not a kill-your-buzz obligation. It is expected protocol. So what does all this mean in practical terms? When someone says NO, it means NO. Regardless of what has happened prior to that moment, 'No' is BIG red light. It also means that cajoling, pleading, or any form of emotional blackmail after that is UNACCEPTABLE.

You must be able to say NO. Be sober enough to be in control. YOU are responsible for your experience. Perceived fear of "confrontation" or "not having someone like you" will only detract from this experience. YOU are in charge of your boundaries and how they get pushed or not. Talk to those around you about anything that could be making you uncomfortable.

## ABOUT OUR GEOGRAPHY

Recycled Rainbow divides itself generally into two major sections. These sections provide different cultural and community possibilities, freedoms and experiences as well as different responsibilities. **Downtown** provides a public, electric area where water, electricity and open space provide its residents with an exciting, vibrant area where dance clubs, stages, theaters and bars pop up out of nowhere. The Invisible City is a secluded area without electricity and water that provides its residents and visitors with privacy and the poten-

tial for a quieter experience.

## **DOWNTOWN**

Downtown provides several electrical and water outlets for you to use and share with other downtown residents. With the provision of electrical power, you are permitted and encouraged to use electricity in building your camp and providing your gifts to the other participants. Cars can be parked in your camp provided they are not parked next to electrical and water “drops” as water spigots tend to drip and create a lot of mud that your vehicle will get stuck in.

## **SOUND INSTALLATIONS**

You may bring amplifiers, PA systems and other hardware that creates and amplifies sound. Due to seasonal residents in the campground, speakers must be pointed East (toward the corn field). If you are creating a sound-intense installation (dance club, stages, etc...) register your installation with the web site. You will be reserved a space in downtown to meet your unique needs.

## **THE INVISIBLE CITY**

The Invisible City is a primitive camping environment in which no electricity or water are provided. It is located on the south end of the camping area separated from the Downtown area with a large open uninhabitable space and traveled to by a roadway accessible to mutant vehicles. The secluded nature of the invisible city provides a perfect place for activities requiring a secluded area.

While the Invisible City is often the quietest area at Recycled Rainbow, participants wishing to bring their own power are welcome to bring it to Participants who bring sound installations into The Invisible City are encouraged to point their speakers East or South. Participants seeking quiet, fear not, the Invisible City is quite deep and provides a lot of area for primitive camping.

## **FIRST AID STARTS WITH YOU!**

While there will be a medic on site, most of the accidents that happen at an event like this are little things. Twisted ankles. Bumps on the head. Sunburn. Minor cuts and scrapes. Putting together a small "field first-aid kit" is a very smart thing to do- especially when you get burnt by your propane stove and need neosporin and a band-aid. Most local drug stores sell pre-packaged home first-aid kits. Bring a couple ACE Bandages and some Aloe gel for sunburn. Bring calo-

mine lotion for poison ivy. Bring a bottle of aspirin. **If you have seasonal allergies, bring your allergy medicine!** And don't forget the bug spray!

## **CHILDREN AND MINORS**

You are more than welcome to bring your children provided you understand what you are bringing them to. There may be many questions and it is recommended that you talk to your children often during the event about what they have seen and be comfortable answering any questions that they have.

Anyone under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who takes full responsibility for those in their care. Anyone of any age is welcome provided they Participate and are FULLY aware of everything in the Survival Guide. Kids also need special attention and supervision; parents/guardians will be responsible for the child's safety and for their actions. There are a number of hazards and things to be careful of, parent/guardians have to be very aware and keep a close eye on their child. Parent/guardians who do not act responsibly for their child's safety may be escorted out of the event.

## **Motorized Vehicles**

You are not permitted to drive your car, motorcycle, atv, golf cart, or motorcycle-type scooter on the campground during the event. "Art Cars" are vehicles that have been radically modified into stunning works of art for the purpose of enhancing the environment. The campground where Recycled Rainbow is held this year is sufficiently large to host a few art cars. If you would like to bring your art car or other modified vehicle to the event, you must register the art car with Recycled Rainbow Department of Mutant Vehicles (using the available form on [www.recycledrainbow.org](http://www.recycledrainbow.org)). You may also register your art car by emailing [dmv@recycledrainbow.org](mailto:dmv@recycledrainbow.org).

## **MUTANT VEHICLES**

A mutant vehicle is some kind of motorized or human-powered contraption of transportation. At its best, a mutant vehicle has the power to amuse, entertain, or confound. These. . . things that we have made also fit the theme of this event in that they have been mutated from something else; the 1985 Oldsmobile into a giant tea-cup, or the bicycle into the mobile light show. Ultimately, this means that some kind of modification is necessary. A stock Camry ain't no mutant vehicle, even if it has weird seat covers. A stock bicycle to ride from camp to camp can be tolerated, but come on! Live a little!

Glam it up, weird it out!

Each mutant vehicle will have to meet some simple requirements for the safety of everybody who attends:

- They gotta have lights, for safety, and dammit, it should be at least slightly creative.
- Prepare for leaks [leave no trace], and if it's motorized, try to keep the visible pollution [i.e. smoke] to a minimum.
- No open flames on the vehicle, also for safety.
- You still have to pay the re-entry fee if you go on a gas run.
- 5 m.p.h. speed limit, just like dirty-hippie-the-burning-man.
- Tire tracks count as leaving a trace, so watch the mud.
- If you're driving/biking/motivating while drunk or stoned, the Spotters are gonna notice, so don't.

When you bring your mutant vehicle to Recycled Rainbow, a member of the Department of Mutant Vehicles will check your contraption out and give you your official RR 08 DMV sticker, which means nothing but is very pretty.

### **NO MOOP IN THE POOP!**

This year, Recycled Rainbow will provide a small number of portable latrines (porta-potties) to provide participants facilities closer to their location. Porta-Potty maintenance (cleaning) requires that only urine, feces and vomit as well as single ply toilet paper be deposited in the potty. Any other material, cans, gum, paper, cigarette butts, chickens, double-ply toilet paper, etc... will break sanitation equipment resulting in the removal of the potties. **Remember: IF IT DIDN'T COME OUT OF YOUR BODY, DON'T PUT IT IN THE POTTY!**

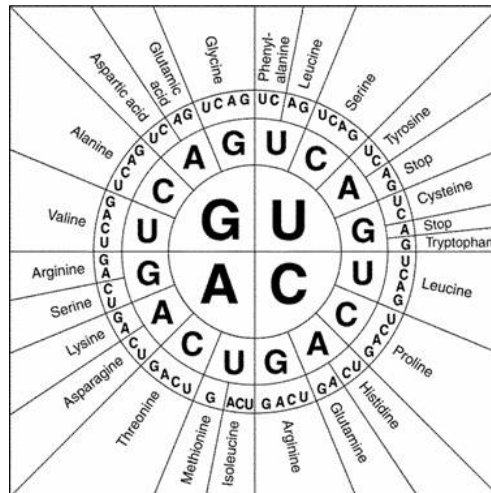
### **NO FIREARMS OR FIREWORKS**

Firearms are explicitly banned, no guns, paintball guns, pellet guns or BB guns are allowed inside the event site. Those discovered with firearms at the event will be told to take them off the event site permanently or they will be escorted out of the event. Failure to comply will result in a permanent ban from future RR events. Use of fireworks or explosives at the event site is prohibited. Fireworks could not only injure and burn people it can cause a fire and destroy property. Anyone caught lighting fireworks may be escorted out of the event.

## LOCAL STATE AND FEDERAL LAWS

RR is a member of the greater community, the greater Cleveland community, Northeast Ohio and The United States. We respect local, state and federal laws and everything we do acts in accordance with those laws. Underage drinking at Recycled Rainbow is prohibited by law. Recycled Rainbow as an organization, does not condone the sale, use, or promotion of illegal drugs. The same laws that apply on Main Street, USA also apply to public areas of our event. Recycled Rainbow also supports your right to privacy. The same laws that apply at your house behind a closed door also apply to your zipped up tent. Problem drug users and dealers that are brought to our attention will be promptly escorted out of the event.



## NO ADVERTISING PROMOTION OR VENDING

Recycled Rainbow is an environment free of commerce. There will be no vendors selling anything- no food, alcohol, souvenirs, batteries etc... The only thing for sale will be ice, because it is impossible to truck ice in or make it on site, and firewood due to the Emerald Ash Borer Beetle. Ice and firewood will be available from the campground owners.

## **VOLUNTEER!**

We have a core group of about 4-6 people that organize the event. Putting everything on one person (web site, PR, organizing, land, keeping it legal, fulfilling the vision, and a ton of other things) is difficult. We have a group of people who are committed to putting a lot of energy and work into it- we always have room for more. If you want to volunteer your time or expertise please contact Recycled Rainbow at [volunteer@recycledrainbow.org](mailto:volunteer@recycledrainbow.org).

This year, people wishing to volunteer can register at the greeter station with Javamama, our volunteer coordinator or one of our enthusiastic greeters.

## **GREETERS**

As a greeter you are everyone's first impression of our temporary community. You sell (or check for) tickets at a checkpoint prior to the campground's entrance, so you get to introduce newbies to our energy. You also communicate the principle ideas behind this event, camping locations, rest room locations, convey the fact we are \*guests\* of the campground, and re-iterate the importance of Leave No Trace.

## **SAFETY**

We always appreciate safety personnel. If you are a certified EMT, Nurse, Firefighter or medical professional certified in first aid, you can volunteer to help our EMT staff by contacting [safety@recycledrainbow.org](mailto:safety@recycledrainbow.org). We suspect basic First Aid problems (cuts and minor burns) will be the biggest concern- though emergencies could be more involved requiring transporting participants to the local emergency room. You may be responsible for manning our medic station/base of operations on Saturday night. The medic station has electricity and a refrigerator. It also has several picnic tables. There will be an SUV in good operating condition with a full gas tank parked next to the pavillion if you need to transport someone.

## **SPOTTERS**

Spotters are the eyes and ears of the event, talking to people, communicating the freedom and ideas of the event, keeping an eye on safety and encouraging discussion and creativity. Spotters are non-confrontational mediators and the liaisons between permanent camp residents and participants.

- \* Help people get the most fun out of the event

**EARTH GUARDIANS**

Earth Guardians. People to ensure that nobody is damaging the grounds- fires, litter, waste disposal, recycling, etc... Some call these "Earth Guardians". Can we light numerous fires and when we leave there's no trace of a fire? No trace of an event? Can we leave the camp area in better shape than when we arrived? YES!

**(DBS) DEPARTMENT OF BUILDIN' SHIT**

While the majority of structures, services and art are built by participants, there are always projects that the Recycled Rainbow organization must provide to participants. This is the job of the DBS. The DBS builds signage, landmarks, safety structures and the occasional creative environmental modification including repair and maintenance of RR property. If you love working HARD as part of an exciting, fun group, love the feeling that comes with kicking ass outdoors and if you are a carpenter, electrician or general handy-man you may want to join the DBS in providing the canvas that RR's participants create the community upon.

**PROMOTION**

Promoters- people to get the word out. The two most important parts in paying for the land and insurance are gatekeepers (who collect

the money/tickets) and PR (who get the people to the gate).

## **COLD AND WET WEATHER CAMPING**

While the end of September isn't *always* cold, there's a very high possibility it will get cold, especially at night. While camping in cold, wet weather can be a challenge it can certainly be done and you *can* be comfortable doing it. Our environment in Ohio has very unpredictable weather and can change at a moments notice. Once moment it's 50 degrees Fahrenheit and raining and the next day it's 75 and sunny. This requires a higher degree of preparedness including how you pack and what you prepare to wear. Here are a few tips to consider:

### **BRING WARM CLOTHES**

While it may not be in the 40s and wet at night, there is a very high possibility it will be. Bringing warm clothes means you have warm clothes when you need them. The most important parts of your body to keep warm are your feet, head and hands. If it turns out not to be cold at night, you can always remove clothing– but if you never bring warm clothes you will not be able to put an extra layer on. **BRING WARM CLOTHES!**

### **BRING EXTRA SOCKS AND SHOES**

At night in the early autumn moisture evaporates into the air and rapidly falls onto the grass. While the ground may not seem to be wet, your shoes and socks will become drenched in water in no time and **your feet will get cold**. Bring plenty of extra socks– woolen if possible– and bring two or three extra pairs of shoes if you can. It will make your experience that much more pleasant and comfortable.

### **BRING A TENT AND SLEEPING BAG**

Recycled Rainbow lasts for four days. Sleep is important at Recycled Rainbow. A tent is an absolute must. Tents keeps water off you and your stuff but tents are not inherently waterproof and may need to be sealed. Read your tent's owner's manual! Sometimes it gets cold at night. You'll want to be warm when you sleep. Sleeping bags rated to at least 40 degrees will ensure you can get hours of warm, dry sleep. If you are sleeping on the ground in your tent, bring a water-resistant foam mat to lay your sleeping bag on.

### **GROUND COVER**

Due to the possibility of rain and the 100% certainty that the ground will be wet, you are **strongly encouraged** to purchase a couple sheets of "visqueen"-type plastic sheeting to place beneath your tent. An old shower curtain works great for this and you can cut it to the size of your tent's floor!

**Important!** Make sure the tarp or plastic **does not extend beyond the edge of your tent**. Extending ground covers beyond your tent will collect dew at night and defeat the purpose of the ground cover!

This will keep any moisture from seeping into your tent. Note that **tents are not generally waterproof** and require extra care in preparing for wet camping. Laying down a ground cover under your tent is one of the oldest and best secrets in the book and will make the difference between a pleasant experience and a miserable one.

### PACK CLOTHES IN A SEALED CONTAINER

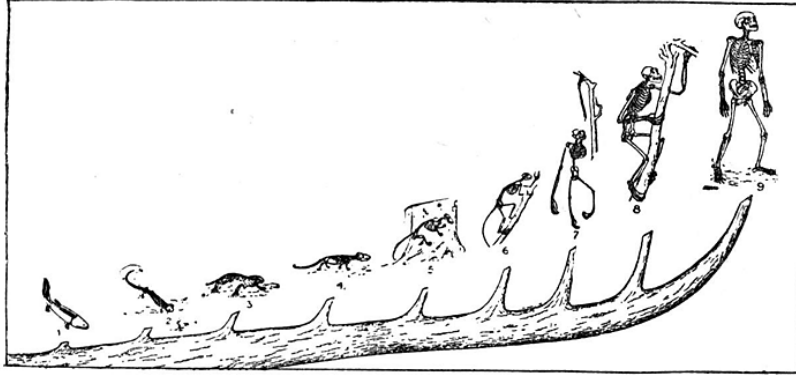
Packing your clothing in a water-resistant container— either a garment bag or garbage bags— will keep your clothes dry at night when the mist-filled night air gets on everything— even inside your tent! Keeping a tarp or plastic sheet on top of your bed at night when you aren't sleeping in it will help make sure your bed is dry and warm when you want to use it.

### POISON IVY

Poison Ivy is a fact of life in camping. Learn how to identify it, and stay away from it! At the end of September, poison ivy will look a little different than what you're looking for during the summer, but it is still toxic and can still make your weekend and long after your weekend a miserable mess. Remember, **the poison part of poison ivy is actually the oil on the plant's leaves**

One of the most effective methods for removing the oil is to use mineral oil (paraffin oil) or pure ethanol to dissolve the oil so that it can be washed away from skin, clothes, tools and other items. According to the FDA, in case of known contact, exposed skin needs to be cleaned within 10 minutes of contact with rubbing alcohol, then washed with water only

In order to preserve the spirit of gifting, our community seeks to create social environments that are unmediated by commercial sponsorships, transactions, or advertising. We stand ready to protect our culture from such exploitation. We resist the substitution of consumption for participatory experience.

### RADICAL SELF RELIANCE

Recycled Rainbow encourages the individual to discover, exercise and rely on his or her inner resources.

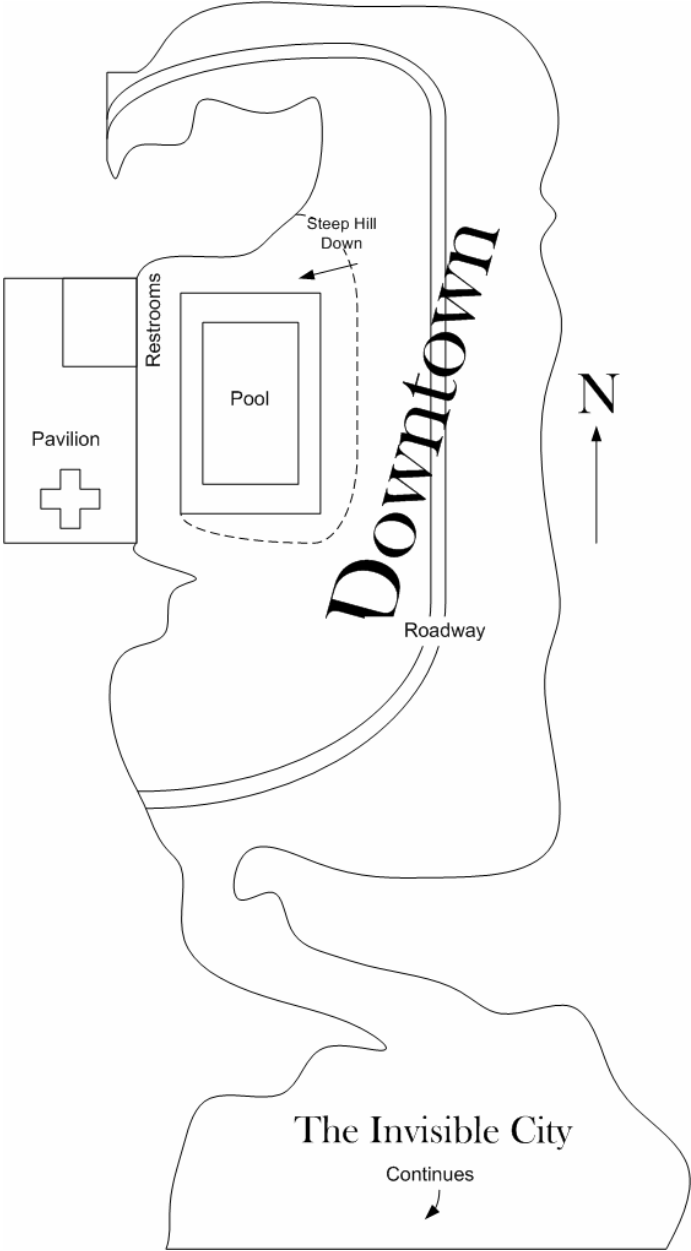
## **IMMEDIACY**

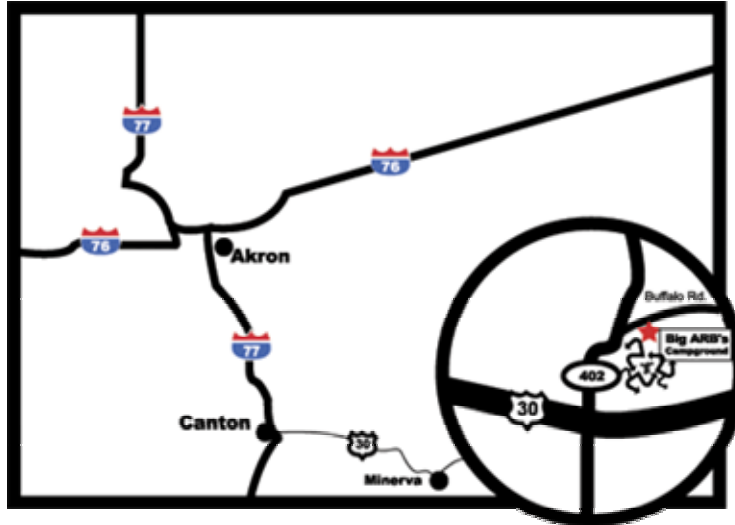
